ENERGY BURDEN IN SOUTHEAST WISCONSIN: APRIL 15 RALLY TO PROTEST UTILITY CUTOFFS

Keviea Guiden led a rally at We Energies to protest utility shutoffs on April 15, the end of the winter moratorium on disconnection. She was joined by dozens of community members as well as Milwaukee common councilmember Alex Brower and State Senator Chris Larson.



CLEAN WISCONSIN





St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Milwaukee just went solar! As part of their mission to be faithful stewards of the Earth, the church is leading by example in their community. Read the full case study to see how they used funding from the Inflation Reduction Act to turn their values into action.

Clean Wisconsin has released a new report, "Local Environmental Benefits of Solar Farming in Wisconsin." The analysis shows how large-scale solar projects can improve soil health on conventionally-farmed land, provide habitat for native pollinators and improve water quality by reducing sediment and chemical fertilizer runoff into nearby waterways. According to the analysis:

- Solar farms that replace conventional row crops like corn and soybeans reduce sediment and phosphorus pollution runoff into nearby lakes, rivers and streams by 75-95%.
- When deep-rooted, perennial vegetation is planted among the panels, solar farms can increase soil carbon sequestration by 65% and improve overall soil health.
- Planting perennial vegetation among the panels also improves wildlife habitat compared to existing cropland, including a 300% improvement in habitat quality for pollinators, which are in steep decline.

Health benefits of solar were also considered as part of the analysis, demonstrating that replacing electricity generated from coal and gas burning power plants with solar energy results in public health benefits of 5-10 cents per kWh in Wisconsin. This savings exceeds the cost of generating solar electricity (3-4 cents per kWh). The full report is available here.

CITIZENS' CLIMATE LOBBY HONORS BOB LINDMEIER

The Madison chapter of <u>Citizens' Climate</u>
<u>Lobby (CCL)</u> honored one of southern
Wisconsin's best-known television
personalities on Earth Day for educating
the public about climate change. **Bob Lindmeier**, longtime chief meteorologist at
WKOW (Channel 27), accepted CCL's
<u>Climate Coverage Champion Award at the</u>
station's studios on April 22.



Lindmeier began linking weather events to global warming in his broadcasts about a decade ago and urged his counterparts across the country to do the same. To that end, he organized the first-ever climate change summit for Wisconsin weathercasters. Off the air, he started speaking about climate change at schools, churches, and civic clubs and at larger events like the annual Garden Expo and Canoecopia paddlesports expo in Madison. To date, he has given more than 200 public presentations on climate change. Lindmeier, who retired in December after 45 years in the broadcast industry, told a Madison writer that love for his children and grandchildren is what motivated him to speak out.


COUILLARD SOLAR FOUNDATION




